Omnino physicus iactus muscarius

April 6th began the test of "Omnino physicus iactus muscarius" at the Greenlake Casting Pier under the tutelage of Certified Master Fly Casting Instructor, **Don Simonson** and his crew. Many of the people who run, walk, skate, etc. the path around Greenlake paused to try to figure out what those people with fly rods were doing as they said, "ssssssSSSTOP!, sssssssSSSTOP!, drift." A few thought there might be some drinking going on when they heard, "lift your elbow!" We've already identified one student who will probably show Don some new wrist techniques before the class is finished.

On the First of the month, we learned that an agency has decided to lump all fish in with the salmon counts on the Columbia and probably other river systems. A replacement to the Fish Passage Center directed its scientists to determine that any scaly things swimming around in a stream count as fish and therefore should be counted. Walleyes and smallmouth bass are scaly and should be counted along with salmon and steelhead. Turtles and sturgeon were excluded because they don't appear to be scaly. A public hearing was held immediately and no objections were voiced so the plan passed.

Also on the First, we learned that the government is allowing the industrial solvent, Dihydrogen Monoxide (DHMO), to be used by the agriculture industry in Eastern Washington. Large amounts will be applied to fields and any excesses will undoubtedly end up in the Yakima and Columbia Rivers. If you go near the streams or lakes in Eastern Washington remember that breathing DHMO can be fatal. You can learn more about this chemical at the website: <http://www.dhmo.org/>. The more you know about chemicals such as DHMO, the better we can

protect our valuable resources.

Now to the serious activity of fishing. Spring is here and it's time to get out and cast flies to hungry trout. **Ron Dion** has a number of outings scheduled. Dry Falls is on the list and though the fishing may not be up to par (based on last year's results) it's still a good opportunity to get together and try the lake. If Dry Falls is off, there are a lot of other opportunities in the area. The Potholes lakes were recommended by **Jeff Korth**, WDFW Region 2 Biologist. The WFFC used to have lots of fun at Windmill, Halfmoon, etc. There are nice fish in Coffee Pot Lake, north of Odessa. The Lahontan Cutthroat should be gathering and active at the north end of Lake Lenore. There have been good reports about Lenice and Nunnally. Pass Lake and Lone Lake have been getting good reports and Green Lake has been planted heavily.

The Yakima yielded trout to ugly wet flies. The Methow gave up Cutthroat, Steelhead and White fish to a variety of chironomides to **Jim McRoberts**. **Chuck Ballard** self-reported two dunks into 18 degrees of cold Methow water. The tarp was summarily provided and Chuck took it like a man. **Mike Wearne** drew our attention to the Tacoma New Tribune article on Curt Goudy that appeared in last month’s Creel Notes. **Pete Crumbaker** fit some fishing in between buying a house, dating (a dubious order of events) and caught a big rainbow on King Lake. **Jim McDonald** started off his report with a visit to the Ghillie’s basket due to failure to share his name. Life on the Green also smelled badly and amounted to a good wade in cold water with snow. I smell skunk again.

Mercifully, the skunky reports ceased before rumors of near total fish kill reverberated around the state. The Skagit produced bright, native Steelhead. **Don Schroeder** admitted to using gear to bring in the rare fish to hand on the Bogachiel.

Mike Wearne started off the new member candidate introductions. **Jim Weaver** and **Paul Mesner** enjoyed praises and membership approval.

But Art Lingren’s first slide gave us an orientation to remote sea-islands near Prince George, British Columbia. To say the least, this late spring and summer of remote fishing (65 days), was a once in a lifetime experience. The main competition seems to be whales and black bear and many trophy fish were brought to hand.

A "Narrative Report" from **Don Gulliford**

Lenice, Nunnally & Bobby

3-18-06 late PM

Late Sunday afternoon, confronted with the temporary closure of Hwy 26 going from Othello to Vantage and requiring a lengthy detour to and on Beverly Burke Road, we opted for the more scenic Crab Cr. road down from Hwy 26 by "Brownie's" at Royal City to Crab Cr. valley (locals claim Grant Co. Road Dist. may have 26 closed for some time--this once-called Smyrna Road may be a more useful detour this spring.) With cold weather and late in day, we interviewed 6 or more at Lenice, Bobby and Nunnally parking lots who reported slow fishing (1-2 small ones only) at Lenice but no red-eared sunfish, even slower at Nunnally and no browns and zilch at Bobby. Interview at Nunnally spiced up by "FisherflyerMan" floating in from atop the Saddle Mountains--this gray haired macho said it is about a 30 minute float down and with good up-drafts he could stay up all day. Several overnight types, huddled by large fires, said consensus of more fishers earlier in day was that poison re-hab is needed for all three.

3-20-06 **Crescent Lake (alongside Canal-north of Quail) South Teal**

Perhaps almost total lack of vehicles or fishertypes was an in-

dicator omen--neither patterns of any type wet or a small boy's lures got any strikes. At South Teal 4 baiters had neither trout or perch, also an indicator that temps need to rise---53F air temp, water must have been colder.

3-20-06

Pit Lake

Same indicia; probably water too cold. This lake with lots of food and weeds, is on our duck club lease, has triploids in the past but no bites on any patterns. Comment: Thumbs up to WDFW on the Potholes access road in from McManaman Road----apparently well graded and some aggregate spread, greatly reducing washboard effect.

Scott Waldie has written three fly fishing books which center around the life of a small Montana community, Travers Corner. The titles of the books are; Travers Corner, Return to Travers Corner and Travers Corner, The Final Chapter.

The books are a series of stories of everyday life in a small town in the West. The main character, Judson C. Clark is the proprietor of the Carrie Creek Boatworks and Guide Service. Jud Clark is the main character in the individual stories.

The businesses of Travers Corner include the Tin Cup Café, Dolores's Hair Salon, McCracken's General Store; you get the idea. Each of the stories includes an aspect of fly fishing incorporated into the plotline, but don't expect to pick up some advice on your casting or fly tying techniques.

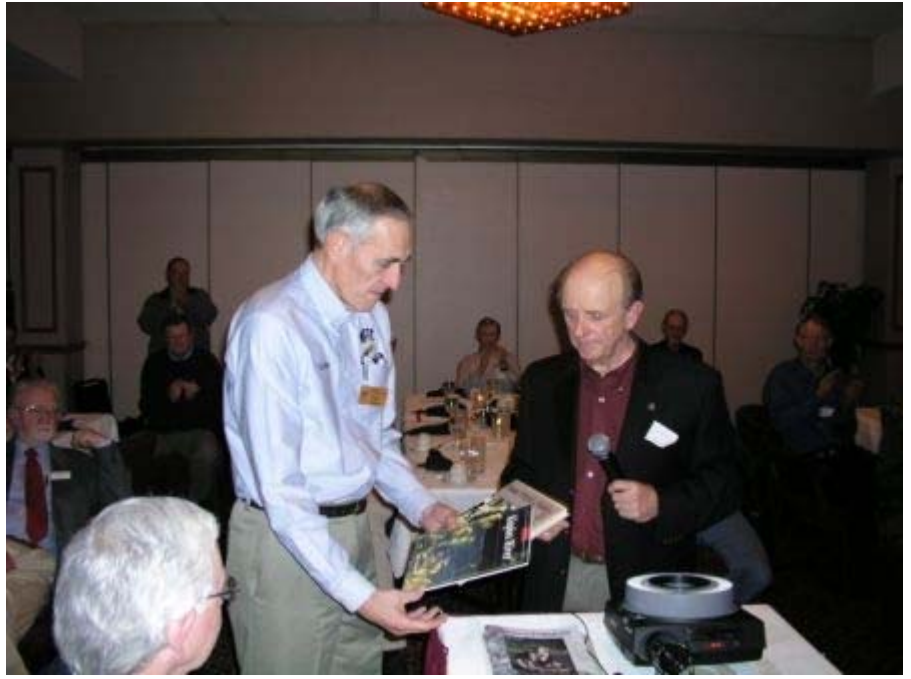
