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## Fishing Report

## My Week at Chopaka

After hearing that the campground at Chopaka had been officially opened in early June my son Kevin and I headed over there on June 18th.

We knew it was going to be busy there when we counted nearly 30 boats on the water as we drove down the road into the campground. ers lined up across the lake and looked to be very successful.

The fishing for me was primarily adult damselfly. I was able to catch a few by casting far enough into the reeds to reach the fish who were actively bumping the emerging bugs off the upright reeds or jumping free of the water to take flying bugs. After finally hooking a fish, getting them out of the reeds to my boat was another story. I found that 6lb fluorocarbon tippet was strong enough to do the job with some care and helped to minimize the trauma time for the fish from hook-up to release. Most

Upon arrival around 1pm we found all of the campsites taken and a lineup of pickup trucks and SUVs across from the boat ramp. The daily collection of day fishers.

Club members Ben Davidson, Ron Little and Mark Pratt were able to get camping spots earlier in the day and were on the water by the time we arrived. We were able to squeeze my small trailer in between two of the sites along shelter row, thanks to some friendly neighbors. Two days later we finally were able to move to a shelter site.

Each day the Chironomid fish-

fish were released without having to touch or handle them. My daily fish count was never over single digit, so fishing was slow for me.

The fly pattern I used was an extended body of thin pre-woven material, appropriately colored and marked, with a foam thorax/head and a sparse grizzly hackle on a size 14 short-shank hook. Both Blue and Tan flies worked.

The rainbows were healthy and strong. Almost all the fish were right at 18" long, bright and full of fight. I did catch two 20"+ fish the last day in a driving rain and wind storm on a stimulator pattern. Occasionally a

My reason for going to numerous places was the large quantity of dead eel grass floating on the surface, and constantly weeding up. Several of my favorite locations were covered with islands of grass. The grass is the worst that I've seen in my 20 years of fishing the Canal.

I caught several cutts and one jack Coho, the largest being 15 inches. I was using a pink Clouser most of the morning and a 300 grain shooting head. I started with a new fly which is primarily orange on an intermediate tipped line, but had no luck with it. I think that the fly needed to be deeper as it was bright and sunny. I positioned my boat in 10 to 15 feet of water and fished towards shore.

## **Jerry Swanson Passes**

Jerry Swanson who was the WFFC President and Honorary Member was remembered by his son;

Edward Gerald (Jerry) Swanson was born in Ferndale in 1916. He passed away peacefully in his sleep on May 28, 2020.

Jerry graduated from Ferndale High School and the University of Washington. He married Regina (Gene) Matz, also of Ferndale. Jerry and Gene moved to Seattle where they raised their three children: Ann, Rick, and Doug. Jerry worked for Boeing for nearly 30 years, then left Boeing to start his own cabinet business from which he retired.

Jerry loved the outdoors and was quite an adventurous guy. He had one of the original Indian motorcycles in the 1930s which he rode from Ferndale to Seattle while at UW, and rode the rails to Chicago during the Depression, among other adventures.

He took his 24 foot boat "Dogpatch" twice to Alaska from Blaine with different family members along. He fished for over 50 years on his boat off the coast of Vancouver Island, sometimes for a month at a time, exploring remote sounds and bays, always chasing the Big One.

His family bought a cabin at Birch Bay in the 1920s which is still in the family today. Jerry spent every summer in his cabin at Birch Bay. At the age of 100, he was the Grand Marshal of the Birch Bay Discovery Days parade, receiving the designation of "Honorary Birch Bay Citizen".

Jerry lived a full and active life for over 103 years and we are all privileged to have had him with us for so long. He had a very strong spirit and passed that on to his children as well as his grandchildren.

We all have beautiful memories of this kind, gentle and wonderful man. We are lucky indeed that we had so many years with him.

He is survived by his three children and their spouses, seven grandchildren, nine great-grandchildren and many nieces and nephews. His wife Gene preceded him in death in December 1983.

His church was the outdoors and fishing was his religion. We know he is in heaven, with a fishing rod in his hand.
