The November 15th WFFC Dinner Meeting will be at the Mercer Island VFW Hall with Brian O'Okeefe about the fly fishing in Oregon.

At age eight, Brian's interest in fly fishing was born while spending summers in Montana with his grand-parents. There he was taught the art of fly casting and fishing by his grandfather, a dry fly purist. From those first years fishing the waters of the Northwest and Montana, he has spent the majority of his free time fishing and taking advantage of all the outdoors has to offer. On family vacations, Brian would often go off alone to fish a nearby stream. His interest in photography began as a means to back up with pictures, what his family thought might be just "tall tales".

Brian has traveled to some of the wildest and most remote angling destinations in the world, including Bikini Atoll, the Seychelles, Kenya, Sierra Leone, Tonga, Cuba and Kashmir. He has also traveled to more accessible locations, such as: the Bahamas, Belize, Costa Rica, Nicaragua, Venezuela, Chile, New Zealand, Christmas Island and more. In many of these locations he again chooses to venture off the beaten path, hiking, floating, sea-kayaking or taking a Zodiac into the backcountry.

Brian lives with his wife and fishing partner, Judith in Powell Butte, Oregon and continues to work as an angling and outdoor photographer, having had photographs published in periodicals such as: the Los Angeles Times; the New York Times; the Miami Herald; USA Today and many others. He has had cover shots in: Field & Stream; Outdoor Life; Fly Fisherman; Fly, Rod and Reel; Fly Fishing Salt Waters; Fly and Fish Magazine; Outside Magazine and Men's Journal. In addition to photography, Brian works as a tackle rep for Scientific Anglers in Washington, Oregon and Alaska

Fishing Conditions on the Eastside

Excellent fly fishing for rainbows, browns and cutthroat trout has been on the increase now that cooler temperatures prevail and fall months are seeing more activity in feeding especially for those who like fishing the terrestrial patterns like hoppers, beetles and ant patterns in the Spokane River and North Fork Coeur d' Alene River, about 1.5 hour drive from Spokane.

The West Slope Cutts are averaging 14 to 24 inches in the NF-CDA and the red band Rainbows are typically 16 to 22 inches in the Spokane River, taking stonefly nymphs and streamers fished in the deeper sections of the lower river.

The lakes around Spokane are, for the most part, fishing well using patterns like Swede's Electric Buggers and Olive Willy patterns stripped low and slow on fast sinking lines. Amber, Fish Trap, Bayley, McDowell and Yocum Lakes are all producing some great fall fishing with backdrops of amazing fall colors. The lower section of Long Lake near Little Falls fishes well for Brown Trout, not to mention Rock Lake south of Cheney that has Brown Trout usually in the lower 20 inch or more range, along with Rainbows and some Steelhead that were planted.

Swede's Fly Shop has personalized fly fishing maps for both the NFCDA, St. Joe and Clearwater drainages to point out best access and best sections to concentrate fly fishing.

Would really enjoy seeing some of the membership make an outing or trip this fall and have a chance to


