"ITS A WRAP"

Now that the fishing for this year is coming to a close it makes one reflect on the past year!

My year finished with a "bang" as Eastern Washington lakes were fishing really well!

Now as the midwinter drearies set in my focus is on fly tying.

Some tying I do is to replace missing patterns and some is to purge flies I never use.

After tying for more than fifty years, I have become interested in tying the more artistic flies like Steelhead and Atlantic Salmon patterns. With a lot of help from YouTube and the local chapter of the Atlantic Salmon Fly tying Guild, getting started is not such a challenge.

What you discover very quickly is the difficulty in acquiring quality feathers as many are unique and as a result very expensive. This, in a way, makes you become creative by using more common feathers dyed (I use permanent markers) to replace expensive ones. The other thing you learn is choosing qualify feathers is critical to this kind of tying.

One major benefit to this learning experience is that you get "very good" at selecting "quality" feathers. This skill will benefit you in buying any of your fly tying materials.

Another thing you learn from all this experience is if you find some great material or feathers don't pass on them even if they seem to be a bit costly because they may not be available for a long time and sometimes never again.

So! My winter is now filled with fun challenges and for those who haven't learned to tie flies yet ,our beginning classes start after the first of the year Fly tying can become almost as fulfilling as fishing, and it really helps pass through the "midwinter drearies."


