My wife, Adair and I are building a fishing cabin in Montana. Our most recent trip there was to meet with our contractor, Tim Yates to settle on a layout. Tim is a young fellow (by my standards

these days) and had spent ten years in the Army before becoming a contractor.

Our property is more than 20 miles up a rough road. The drive takes about two hours. After detailed discussions regarding the building of our

home we had time to really get to know one another. During our conversation I asked Tim what he does when he isn't building houses. I was hoping he would tell me that he spent most of his time fishing and would give me and Adair places that only the locals know about! Wishful thinking on my part. It turns out that Tim does fly fish. However, when not building houses, he spends a good deal of his time helping his father run a non-profit organization called 'Task Force Heroes.' Task Force Heroes provides support for first responders, active-duty military, and veterans suffering from PTSD. Tim and his father bring people out to a ranch in Montana. Along with spiritual and personal counseling the attendees are taught fly tying, fly fishing, and archery. I told Tim that Task Force Heroes sounds like Project Healing Waters.

Tim proceeded to tell us that during a training exercise his femur was shattered, requiring three surgeries and countless hours of physical therapy. While going through that ordeal the Army stationed him in Washington State at Fort Lewis. Fort Lewis is one of several places in Washington State that has a PHWFF program. This is where Tim learned all things fly fishing. Now back in Montana, Tim runs his own business and supports his father at Task Force Heroes; sharing his spirituality and all that he learned about fly fishing at PHWFF to others in need while on their journey to recovery.

Kindness has a ripple effect.


Monthly Meeting Location

Fly Tyers Corner, Book Review

From Dan Henke The Feather Mechanic II: Beyond the Pattern

by Gordon van der Spuy



The Feather Mechanic is back and this time he brought friends. South African tyer Gordon van der Spuy recently published a second volume and it is every bit as good as the first.

This time, though, van der Spuy is joined by some of the world's best tyers: Hans van Klinken, Barry Ord

Clarke, Wayne Luallen, Steven Fernandez, Umberto Oreglini, Davy Wotten, and others from around the world. It's quite a collection of tyers, and of patterns.

The author begins with his mantra – function over form, thread control, understand the materials. Then each of the tyers introduces a pattern, sometimes an old stand-by, sometimes new, with its history, how the fly developed, why he likes it, and how to fish it.

The book is worth its price just for those stories. Each pattern comes with van der Spuy's clear and com-

plete instructions and, as I've come to expect from him, exquisite drawings. The instructions and drawings are so good that no beginning tyer should shy away from using this volume to get started in the hobby. But van der Spuy includes the nuances of each tie, tips you can't get off a video, which will appeal even to advanced tyers. Van der Spuy is rapidly becoming one of my favorite tying authors.

Fly of the Month

Crayfish Pattern

Materials:

Hook size 2-6

Thread to match body (brown)

Weight, lead wire layers

Feelers, tan bucktail

Eyes: varnished false flower stemens from a craft store

Legs, brown partridge hackle

Claws, natural squirrel tail

Thorax, chocolate mink with plenty of guard hairs

Carapace, as Thorax but with less guard hair

Shell casing over thorax and carapace, brown flxibody

Rib 6lb nylon

Coloring, Prismart pens

Dressing:

Run the thread down the shank catch in a length of lead wire, wind the wire to the eye and back. (I build a second layer under the shank). Varnish or superglue the wire, tie in two eyes and the feelers, at the bend and catch in the waste and bind along the shank.

Next cut the claws from two small bunches of squirrel tail, tie them separatley on top of the hook and figure of eight each one to make them stand out and "claw like", varnish the butts and tie down.


Take a 1/4 inch wide strip of flxibody and tie in behind the eyes, select a partridge hackle of a size that will represent the legs, strip off the flue and stroke the fibers downwould measure the length of the thorax and tie the feather in by the tip concave side facing down, rake some mink fur and mix together then dub onto the thread and dub a thick thorax, pull the flexibody over the top and tie down.

Tie in a length of the 6lb nylon (about 6 inches) then another piece of flexibody making sure it is long enough to reach just past the hook eye.

Rake some of the mink underfur and dub the body fairly thick. Taking care now stretch the flexibody very tightly to the eye and tie it down but dont cut it off. Bring the rib over very tightly in even spiral pulling it into the flexibody to create the segments.

Tie off and cut off the waste rib, cut the overhanging piece of flexibody(which should now be laying over the hook eye) into the shape of the crayfish tail.

Color to your liking and then varnish over the flexibody two or three coats.



sealed shut.




Don't throw it away; try this.

Squeeze the glue up to the cap end, cut straight across the bottom, squeeze and it will apply a thin strip instead of a glob which is a much easier way to apply.

Then to seal the tube, squeeze the glue up toward the cap again, pinch the bottom with pliers and fingers, squeezing out any glue at that end, wipe well with rubbing alcohol.

Next time, cut straight across the bottom again.
