FFI Conservation Effort

'You Can Help Make a Difference' Olympic Peninsula Rivers Campaign

From Neal Hoffberg, 2nd Vice President - Programs Friends,

This year the Washington Council of Fly Fishers International joined a coalition of outdoor and environmental groups in a campaign to restore salmon and steelhead habitat on the Olympic Peninsula. Now we need your help to move it ahead.

The Wild Olympics campaign would preserve fish habitat and public fishing access by designating key river drainages on the peninsula as Wild



and Scenic Rivers and expanding wilderness areas around Olympic National Park. Federal legislation implementing the plan passed out of a Senate committee last spring. Now FFI needs your help urging Washington Senators Patty Murray and Maria Cantwell to push it to a vote on the Senate floor.

We are so close to making the Wild Olympics a reality this year. That's why we are asking FFI members to help get Wild Olympics over the finish line before this Congress ends in December. We've made it easy. Click on the link below to open a letter to Sens. Murray and Cantwell. You are free to change the letter to reflect your views or simply sign and send. All personal information will be kept confidential.

The Wild Olympics Wilderness & Wild & Scenic Rivers Act protects the habitat on which we can rebuild salmon and steelhead runs. It preserves our fishing access. It widens stream buffers. It improves water quality and builds upon dam removal efforts that are already helping restore peninsula fish runs. You can keep the progress going by urging Sens. Murray and Cantwell to push the Wild Olympics Act to a vote. Your letter can help make a difference in this campaign. Please act today.



This year we are continuing the popular WFFC Beginning Fly Tying Class. The class will be held on two consecutive days: March 29th and 30th (Saturday and Sunday). Class times are 9:00AM until 4:30PM, including a 90-minute BYO lunch. The location will be at a private eastside house. (Address to be given to enrollees via email). Cost is \$80. Non-members and members are welcome. Class size is limited to 8.



Each student will be given a well written and illustrated Fly Tying Manual that includes a DVD on each fly being taught. You will learn to tie a San Juan Worm, Zebra Midge, the Brassie, Woolly Bugger, Gold Ribbed Hare's Ear, Rubber-Legged Beetle and Elk-Hair Caddis. All tying materials will be provided. Tools and vises will be available for your use in the classes.

Additionally, we will guide you in choosing the appropriate tools and materials as you continue your journey in fly tying.

December Fly of the Month

Blue Dun Chromer



Hook:	Daiichi 1760, size 12
Thread:	UTC, 70 denier
Butt:	Wine-colored thread
Body:	Blue Dun-colored thread
Thorax:	Black thread
Gill:	Antron yarn
Rib Body:	Fine black wire
Coating:	Coat with Loctite brushable Super
	Glue, finish with a coat of Sally
	Hansen clear fingernail polish

Hook Size to Bead Size		
HOOK SIZE	BEAD SIZE	
#22-26	¹ / ₁₆ inch (1.5 mm)	
#18-22	5/64 inch (2.0 mm)	
#16-18	³ / ₃₂ inch (2.5 mm)	
#14-16	7/64 inch (3.0 mm)	
#12-14	¹ / ₈ inch (3.5 mm)	
# 8-10	⁵ / ₃₂ inch (4.0 mm)	

Note: This is a universal measurement chart, but some beads may not fit on the hook size listed because of variations in hook models.

Pattern of the Month From Creel Notes October 1976 By the late Vince Sellen

Hot Buttered Rum

Type: Wet

Timing: Best during cold damp days.

Drink Preparation: A heaping teaspoon of spiced batter, add 2 oz.rum (Coachman brown preferred). Fill preheated mug to the brim with hot water. Sort of caress the lip of the mug with lemon before serving or add a bit of lemon peel to the mixture. Sprinkle the top with a touch of nutmeg.

Batter: Cream ¹/₄ pound of butter with 1 pound of dark brown sugar. Add ¹/₄ teaspoon each, ground cinnamon, ground nutmeg and ground cloves. To store refrigerate in covered container.
